of Canadians know someone who has a physical disability1

Calgarians identify as living with some form of disability<sup>2</sup>

These numbers are growing and will increase by an estimated 1.8% annually over the next decade, largely due to an aging population<sup>3</sup>

Canadians are concerned - more than two-thirds of Canadians are worried that a loved one will need to learn to live with a physical disability in the next decade1

We often take for granted the ability to access the buildings and spaces in our communities, even our own homes. For those living with a physically disability, accessibility affects every aspect of daily life



Those with a physical disability often face a higher cost of living related to the need for assistive equipment and modifications to make homes more accessible



Universal design in new building projects can be achieved with little to no impact on cost4



Accessible home modifications can cost tens of thousands of dollars but making these enhancements can future-proof your home and increase its value



1 in 3 Canadians say their home would present difficulty to a person with a physical disability<sup>1</sup>

## Common accessibility challenges include1:

- 1. No elevator / no ramps / too many stairs
- 2. Doors that are difficult to open or doors that don't open automatically
- 3. Inaccessible washrooms
- 4. Narrow doorways and hallways
- **5.** A lack of accessible parking

## Benefits of universal design include:

- 1. Reducing social isolation and improving the mental and physical health of individuals with disabilities
- 2. Greater independence for those with disabilities
- 3. Greater access to employment opportunities for those with disabilities
- 4. Increased economic benefits for local businesses
